Our school values underpin our vision and act a as a guide to enable all pupils to become good citizens and effective learners; they act a moral compass to influence them now and in the future. Each Christian value historically refers to values derived from the teachings of Jesus Christ.				
Theological grounding of vision firmly rooted in Christian narrative	As a church school we take the teachings of the Bible as our foundation and the inspiration for our actions and decisions. "During the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus made it clear that we are the light of the world. We are called to shine. But the light we share is not our own. "Let your light shine." Matthew 5:16 Because of our Christian vision, we share our light with all, our light continually sustains and strengthens us and encourages us to be the best we can be. Our saint, Barnabas, son of encouragement, reinforces our Christian vision and is an inspiration to our community, which has faced and continues to face significant challenges. Context (key areas unique to your school)	School sits in an area of high social deprivation with an IDACI of 0.22. The overall IDACI score for Warrington is 0.14. 80% of pupils live in top 3 most deprived deciles nationally. The proportion of disadvantaged pupils has increased significantly over the last 3 years from 37.9% in 2018 to 61% in 2022. This increase has been accompanied by an increase in the pupils on the school's vulnerable list, which now sits at 41% pupils. The proportion of pupils with an EHCP has decreased over the last 3 years from 4.6% in 2018 to 1.05% currently, however there has been an increase in % of pupils SEND from 11.8% in 2018 to 16.1% in September 2022. The breakdown of SEND shows the large majority of pupils are supported due to SLC (46.7%) and SEMH (31.1%) and 15.6% with MLD. There has also been an increase in EAL numbers from 24.4% in 2018 to 41.1% currently, this is significantly above the Warrington average for pupils who do not have English as their first language is 12.1% and above the national average of 21.1%. St Barnabas celebrates 17 languages other than English within our school community and 46.3% of our pupils are BME compared to the Warrington average of 18.9% and the national average of 34.8%. The pandemic has had significant impact on the local community, which faces many health, financial and social challenges: Crime rates in the locality are the highest in Warrington, at 271.63 per 1000 population, in comparison to the Warrington average of 77.78 per 1000. The ward inhabited by the large majority of pupils also has a rate of anti-social behaviour which is significantly above the Warrington average.

	Vision is at the core of all decision making and drives us to strive for excellence in every aspect of our work. "Jesus said, come live your life the way God wants you to." Matthew 1:17 Vision is embedded in curriculum intent and shapes all policies. Our vision and values are highly visible through school environment and impact on enriching the lives of our pupils and the wider community and enabling our whole school and church community to flourish. Our vision sustains and guides us through challenges, including lockdowns. 2. Wisdom, knowledge & skills	As a result of our Christian vision, the unique needs of our whole school community are nurtured and supported very effectively, enabling pupils to achieve extremely well. Highly effective, inclusive, well-sequenced, broad and balanced curriculum, enhanced by a full programme of enrichment activities, '5E Enrichment Model," which is rooted in our Christian vision that enables all our pupils to flourish. Staff at all levels are extremely well trained with knowledge and skills to ensure pupils can 'let their light shine.' Approach to spiritual development, which is embedded throughout curriculum, enables all children to reflect on their choices and decisions. Worship, pop-up prayer spaces and opportunities embedded within the curriculum give pupils opportunities to develop spiritually and reflect on big questions. All monitoring data indicates that pupils make consistently good progress from their starting points across the whole curriculum – see monitoring docs, data summaries, pupil workbooks. Pupils achieved above the national average in reading, maths and combined attainment at the end of KS2 data, with progress above the national average in all subjects The achievement of disadvantaged pupils was higher than national in all subjects. RE data shows an improving trend over time for all groups of pupils, including pupils working at greater depth. Our children demonstrate high levels of resilience, optimism and compassion as a result of the well-structured yet holistic approach to the teaching of our core Christian values. Our full curriculum offer develops aspiration in all pupils to make a positive impact as global citizens with a strong sense of community and place. The school's well-planned enrichment offer (hyperlink to 5E Enrichment Model) demonstrates our commitment to our Christian vision. Our children live out our vision and values; this is demonstrated through commitment and dedication to a wide range of pupil leadership roles. Our children are equipped with the spiritual strength to deal with challenges and respond with humility and resourcefulness. Pupil achievement data shows a positive picture, with many strengths across the curriculum. Pupils drive and lead our support for a wide range of charities, including St Rocco's, Warrington Foodbank, Macmillan, Children in Need, Comic Relief, Ukraine Appeal and Christian Aid Curriculum is well planned to develop children's understanding of social action and who they can make changes within their local area and the wider world. As a result of our school vision and values, our school community is highly inclusive, celebrates diversity and values differences. This enables our children to flourish, develop positive relationships, live and disagree well together. Highly effective pastoral system ensures all stakeholders receive a well-rounded wellbeing offer that promotes the good mental health and wellbeing of all. (breakfast club, magic breakfast, forest school, counselling, trauma informed intervention, extensive support from outside agencies, pupil wellbeing clubs, yoga, gardening, healthy lifestyles club, PSHE curriculum, 5E Enrichment Model.)
